

Dean's Comments....

"I've Got a Job!"

As an aspiring teacher or administrator, you plan to complete your certification or degree, and then hope to say, "I've Got a Job!" Our College of Education faculty and staff want you to find a fulfilling and exciting job in your chosen field, and we work collaboratively to support you in your endeavor.

At a recent Saturday recruitment, one of the parents asked "How will you help my daughter get a job when she is finished with her program?" Dr. Shahid, our Chair of Teacher Education, and I were happy to be asked this question because we think our College of Education works hard to provide preparation and strategies for securing your job. Here are some ways we help you to find that job:

- Our College of Education faculty offer courses that are an important blend of theory and practice, preparing you to employ best practices in your pedagogy. Learning how to teach, including your planning, lesson delivery, assessment and reflection are all important ways you prepare for teaching.
- Your content area major and minor faculty offer courses that are rich in content area knowledge, preparing you to offer a depth of information in your teaching.
- An annual Mock Interview night is held each winter semester to help you prepare for the interviewing experience. We also offer a Resume Station to help you review and refine your resume. This year's Mock Interview night is January 17, 2018. Contact jcenters@madonna.edu to reserve your space, as they are limited. Don't wait until your last year of the program to attend a Mock Interview night. If you feel you aren't quite ready, then please contact Society of Future Teachers to volunteer to help. That will give you an opportunity to watch the Mock Interviews and feel more comfortable when you decide to sign up for them.

- We also hold an annual Education Job Fair each year. This job fair is only for Madonna education students and alumni, and is free. We generally have 15-20 recruiters from public and private schools, as well as recruiters from substitute and tutoring organizations. This is an opportunity to meet with recruiters who are looking for teachers (both general and special education), paraprofessionals, administrators and substitute teachers. The annual Job Fair will be held on March 23, 2018.
- As job postings and inquiries from schools arrive, we post them on our Facebook, hallway bulletin boards, and share them in classes. We also email recent graduates with postings specific to their certification or major area.

In addition to the preparation and strategies listed above, we work to consistently update our curriculum and assessments in order to stay current with the demands of our profession. Your curriculum has been aligned to InTASC and other specific professional standards. We also continue to research and refine best practices and dispositions that are critical to your success as an educator and leader. We look forward to hearing you tell us "I got a job, and I feel well-p repared!"

Plan Ahead for 4000-level Courses Teacher Education Program

Students seeking admission to the **Teacher Education Program** (**TEP**) have the following deadlines to choose from within the 2017-2018 academic school year. Since you <u>must</u> be admitted into the TEP in order to take any 4000-level EDU courses, it is crucial to **plan ahead!**

<u>App Deadline</u>: Monday, February 19, 2018 <u>TEC Meeting</u>: Wednesday, February 21, 2018

App Deadline: Monday, May 7, 2018 TEC Meeting: Wednesday, May 9, 2018

NOW is the time to start the application process, if you haven't already done so. If you are currently enrolled in EDU 2000, you should be thinking about starting the admission process. The materials required for applying to the TEP can be found by logging into MY Portal through www.madonna.edu. The steps are below.

- Go to www.madonna.edu, click on "MY Portal," and log-in
- > Click on the blue "Students" tab along the top
- Click on the "Find MY Form" link along the left
- ➤ Click on "T" for Teacher Education (locate the TEP application and Recommendation Forms)

The next Teacher Education Committee meeting to review candidates for admission to TEP and Student Teaching is **Wednesday**, **February 21**, **2018**. Please submit all admission materials to Janice Centers (Room 2230C or TEP wooden submission box in Room 2228) by the deadlines listed above.

To enroll in 4000-level courses, students <u>must</u> first be admitted to the Teacher Education Program by meeting the following requirements:

5. Submission of two professional recommendations:

- **One** from a University professor in the content area major (Comprehensive Elementary majors must receive recommendation from professors outside of the College of Education)
- **One** from a University professor and/or a professional reference outside the University. (This recommendation cannot come from College of Education faculty).
- 6. **Successful completion of the SAT** (or the proper combination of alternative measures)

SAT Registration Issues

Since the SAT is the State's newly required basic skills exam for students pursuing their initial teaching certificate, registering for the exam online can be tricky as a post-high school student.

Here are some helpful directions:

- To register for the SAT, go to <u>www.collegeboard.org</u> and click on "Register for the SAT"
- 2) On the Personal Information page when you reach "Your High School", you'll notice that the month is pre-selected. Click on the month pull-down and select the word MONTH.
- 3) You can leave the word YEAR in the year box.
- 4) On the "Grade on Test Date" pull-down menu, select NO LONGER IN HIGH SCHOOL".

By following these directions, you'll be able to move ahead without errors.

Changes to Michigan Teaching Certificates

Effective immediately, the Michigan Provisional certificate has been changed to the <u>Standard Teaching Certificate</u>. If you already hold a Provisional Certificate you will see that the name of your certificate has been changed if you look it up on the Michigan Department of Education's website. In addition to this name change, these are additional changes to the certificate:

- The initial Standard Teaching Certificate will be a <u>five-year certificate</u>, not a six-year certificate.
- The Standard Teaching Certificate <u>renewal will be</u> <u>for five years</u>, not for three years.
- The Standard Teaching Certificate can be <u>renewed</u> an unlimited number of times, instead of twice.
- 150 DPPD hours (District Provided Professional Development) can now be used to renew the Standard Teaching Certificate, along with the other options.
- Education-related professional learning to renew the Standard Teaching Certificate must be completed since the issue date, but no longer needs to be completed in the three years preceding the date of application for the renewal.
- The Standard Teaching Certificate can be renewed one-time using an education-related Master's degree or higher earned at any time from a regionally-accredited college or university.

Although the names of existing Provisional Teaching Certificates and Provisional renewals will be changed to Standard, the expiration dates on the existing sixyear certificates and three-year renewals will not change.

We're excited about these additions to our program and believe they'll be very valuable to you. While these courses are required for Children and Families majors, they are open to ALL Child Development and Early Childhood Education majors. Please see Dr. Tomczyk for more information.

- 3) Fall 2018 Applications for Directed Teaching (CF 4930) and the Practicum (CD/ECE 3930 and ECE 5930) are due *February 1, 2018*, which is coming up soon! Please make an advising appointment with Dr. Tomczyk to make sure you have taken all of the prerequisites. The applications can be accessed from the Portal by following these steps:

- 3) For CD 4930, the correct form is <u>Application for</u> <u>Early Childhood Development Directed Teaching</u>; for

- The initial Standard CTE Certificate will be valid for five years instead of six years.
- The Standard CTE Certificate can be <u>renewed</u> an unlimited number of times.
- The Standard CTE Certificate <u>renewal will be</u> <u>for five years</u>, not for three years.
- The Standard CTE Certificate can be renewed one-time using an education-related Master's degree or higher earned at any time from a regionally-accredited college or university.
- 150 DPPD hours (District Provided Professional Development) can be used to renew the Standard CTE Certificate, in addition to the other Professional Development options.

Master's in Literacy Education

This is a reminder to any student planning to graduate this year that to obtain the state endorsement as a Reading Specialist K-12 (BR), students must have successfully completed all the requirements for the MAT: Literacy Education degree, and have the degree posted to their transcripts. In addition, they must also pass the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification (MTTC) for Reading Specialist—Test #92. It is strongly recommended that all the required coursework be completed before attempting the test.

Madonna University Commencement takes place during the first weekend in May. There is only one commencement ceremony each year. Students complete degrees and graduate officially in December, April, and July, but everyone participates in the May commencement ceremony. Students are encouraged to respond to the invitation and to participate in commencement.

MAT Literacy Education

Attention all educators! Passionate about literacy? Want to improve the instruction in your classroom or further your own education? The Master of Arts in Teaching with a specialty in Literacy Education is the graduate degree program for you! This program is designed to enable certified classroom teachers to develop the competencies that qualify them to be reading specialists according to the criteria of the International Literacy Association and the Michigan Department of Education. The program is aligned with all mandated Michigan Department of Education standards and is approved for a K-12 endorsement to elementary and secondary teaching certificates.

This program is comprised of thirteen courses for a total of 34 credits. It combines face-to-face and on-line classes. Courses include Literacy Coaching and Leadership, Foundations of Literacy Education, Diagnostic Procedures in Reading, and Developing and Assessing Literacy Programs. The program also includes a focus on practicums and field experience in literacy interventions, and program assessment and development. These vital skillsets prepare teachers for improving students' reading and language skills in all content areas and establish professional relationships.

This graduate program focuses on the knowledge, skills, and dispositions of effective reading specialist literacy leaders. The 34 semester-hour program is intended to enhance candidates' roles as teachers, literacy coaches, interventionists, and coordinators. We are ready and prepared to help you achieve your expanded educator goals!

The College of Education offers three graduate degree/endorsement programs: Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD), Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH), and Learning Disabilities (LD). We also offer a Certificate Program in Effective Inclusionary Practices. These programs provide comprehensive study in each specialty area and enable teachers to effectively meet the individual behavioral, social, and academic needs of students with disabilities in all learning environments. The professional knowledge, skills, and dispositions addressed in the programs also enable general educators and special educators to effectively communicate and collaborate to meet the needs of all learners. Having an endorsement and/or Master's in special education will assist you in serving all of the students in your classroom.

The College of Education is committed to making your academic experience at Madonna University highly engaging and relevant. Our on-going relationships with special education agencies at the state and local level, along with our dedicated faculty and student body, ensures that our programs are aligned with the changing needs in schools today.

Madonna's graduate certificate program in <u>Effective Inclusionary Practices</u> is a 10 credit program consisting of three courses for teachers who want to meet the unique needs of students with various disabilities in the general education classroom. A certificate of completion in this area of study will distinguish you from other general education teacher candidates. It demonstrates your commitment to meeting the needs of all students in your classroom. The 10 credits can also be applied to your teacher certification renewal requirements.

Education Specialist Program in Educational Leadership

The College of Education at Madonna University offers an advance graduate studies degree in Educational Leadership. The Education Specialist Degree (Ed.S.) prepares school personnel for leadership positions within the central office, such as curriculum and instructional directors, department chairs, assistant superintendents and it supports those aspiring to be school superintendents. The program is designed to support educators who want to build a vision for educational service delivery and develop the leadership skills necessary to bring the vision to fruition. The program includes a focus on strategies and outcomes for students who face unique challenges (e.g. poverty, special needs, English language learners) and meets the Michigan Department of Education standards and requirements for central office administrators by giving leaders the knowledge, skills, and dispositions to lead other leaders.

The program uses a cohort model and is comprised of ten courses taken over a two year period, for 30 total credits. The first year includes one Spring/Summer course. The program combines face-to-face and online classes. The courses are Strategic Planning and Program Assessment, Leading Teaching and Learning, Leadership in Data-Driven Decision Making, Collaboration and Consultation for Community Engagement, Leadership: Vision into Action; School Finance and Resource Allocation and Legal and Ethical Issues in Educational Policy. Students must also complete an internship and an action research project in two additional courses.

A master's degree is one of the admission requirements for the Ed.S. program. We are accepting applications for Fall 2018. You can register for up to six credits prior to admission.

New Graduate Certificate in Online Instruction Approved!

Recently, the Graduate Council at Madonna University gave the College of Education the approval to offer a Graduate Certificate in Online Instruction. This certificate is a four-course (12 semester hour) sequence that can be completed in one full academic year (fall/winter/summer). It will provide students from the education sector as well as the corporate and non-profit sectors foundational knowledge in instructional design, the creation of resources, and assessment in online environments. The four courses are:

- EDU5410 Instruction Design for Online Learning (fall)
- EDU5430 Media Production for Online Instruction (fall)
- EDU6430 Online Assessment Practices (winter)
- EDU6880 Online Teaching Project and Practicum (summer)

Further, all four courses are part of the MAT in Online Teaching and eLearning course of study. As such, students can earn the certificate, and then proceed to completing the Master's degree if they choose.

Currently, there are no requirements or endorsements to teach K-12 courses in the State of Michigan, other than having a valid teaching certificate. However, while there

is a large overlap in the skill set needed to teach online and the skill set needed to teach in a brick-and-mortar setting, there are subtle nuances needed to be a successful online instructor.
