Christmas in Poland: Wesolych Swiat Bozego Narodzenia

The Christmas season in Poland starts on December 6th. Star carriers, or Gwiazdory walk through villages singing songs and doing puppet shows about the birth of Jesus.

On Christmas Eve, people do not eat any food until they see the first star, called the Gwiazdka ("little star"). Then they eat a big dinner called Wigilia. There is special food for this dinner: fish, pierogi (pasta filled with cheese, potato, and cabbage), uszka (mushroom ravioli), and barszcz (beet soup). Some hay is put under the tablecloth in memory of Jesus in the manger. An empty chair is set at the table for an unexpected guest who may arrive. Before the meal, family and friends share an oplatek, or large wafer, with a picture of Mary, Joseph, and Jesus. Each person takes a piece and then wishes others good health and happiness in the coming year. After dinner, there is a midnight mass (Pasterka), and people sing Christmas carols called koledy. Wesolych Swiat, Bozego Narodzenia I Szczesliwego Nowego Roku!
